HOW TO APPLY

Applicants must submit our online application to be considered. Our staff will reach out to your study abroad office to confirm they have met all the necessary requirements of your office to study abroad before accepting your student.

LOCATION




Home to the oldest university in Europe, the University of Bologna attracts students from all over Italy and the world. With this student focus, it makes it the perfect place. for students to study abroad.

The academic offerings are central to the Italy Center experience.

Italy Center students may enroll in various courses belonging to the humanities, social sciences, and business realms. The program offers a selection of twenty courses throughout the academic year, where approximately seven courses per semester meet general core requirements.

In addition, we also offer Internships and Undergraduate Research for academic credit for students who really want to immerse themselves and/or need specific course credit while their semester abroad. The Italy Center provides logistical coordination and academic oversight to mature students who are willing to integrate and apply skills in an internship or a research project. Students are assigned to a faculty and in many cases to a community leader who will assist the student in guiding the student through the experience.

One of the most exciting aspects of the Spring Hill College Italy Center is the opportunity for American students to share a community with a group of Italian college students.

Very few study abroad programs in Italy offer this opportunity to live like a true Italian college student. It is cultural immersion at its absolute best.

The residence hall at Camplus Alma Mater, offers services comparable to what students find in the most modern American campus residence halls. All rooms (private, double or triples) have a view of a garden area, yet students live within minutes of the bustling University of Bologna District. Alma Mater includes a conference hall, study rooms (with computers), a library with newspapers and periodicals, garden, private gym, laundry facilities, TV room, music room, and an outdoor basketball court.

Spring Hill College students either share a room with one or two fellow Americans who are also attending the Italy Center or can select the privacy of a single room.

In the residence hall setting, students will be encouraged to participate in recreational activities and communal life initiatives, including dinners and athletic tournaments with Italian students.

Approximately 100 Italian and a few European students reside at the Collegio Alma Mater each semester. The residence hall is staffed by an Italian team of student life professionals and provides a 24/7 receptionist. The grounds are secured with video surveillance day and night. The Alma Mater building is located in an area of town in which large numbers of students from the University resides.

The SHC Italy Center leverages its relationships with activists, community organizers, and academics allowing students experience and engage with authentic Italian communities.

Your students will have the opportunity to learn more about the issues facing Italy and the rest of Europe through our classes, travel, and service opportunities.

Due to the fact that Bologna is such a diverse city full of opportunities, we have created many partnerships with local immigrant communities, political groups, non-for-profit organizations, NGO's, and everything in between. Students who have scholarships that require service hours to retain will be able to do so while in Italy. In adherence to the Jesuit tradition, our goal at the Italy Center is

Nearly all American-Italy based study abroad programs offer some form of travel for their students, yet the majority of them focus on traditional Western European. Our program fees include an orientation trip (2-3 days) and a mid semester tour (5-7 days).

Travel with the Italy Center isn't based upon any guidebooks - it's based on current events, local knowledge, our experiences and connections made with the people we meet. Our trips are designed to deeply explore the real issues facing out travel destinations and the people in the communities we visit.
